"Shem Pete's Alaska: The Territory of the Upper Cook Inlet Dena'ina" by James Kari and James A. Fall with Principal contributions from Shem Pete. Definitive history of the Upper Cook Inlet Dena'ina with numerous photographs and maps. A very important and significant body of work on the Dena'ina. N 979.83 Shem (2003)

"Dena'ina Etnena-Tanaina Country" by James Kari and Priscilla R. Kari. A study of the geography and physical resources of the Dena'ina peoples with lists of place names, trails, and important features. N 917.98001 Kari (1982)

"K'tl'egh'l Sukdu A Dena'ina Legacy-The Collected Writings of Peter Kalifornsky" Edited by James Kari and Alan Boraas. Compiled over a 19-year period by one of the last speakers of the Kenai dialect of the Dena'ina language. N 398.2097983 Kal (1991)

"Dena'ina Topical Dictionary" by James Kari. An important preservation of the Dena'ina language in topical format from "Animals" to "Utensils" with special sections on foods, games, music, and stories. N 497.1 Kari (2007)

"Dena'ina Etnena-A Celebration, Voices of the Dena'ina" Edited by Karen E. Evanoff. Printed in full color, this richly illustrated volume is a heartfelt story of the Dena'ina people and their diverse culture. Wonderful photographs and a nice selection of maps utilizing aerial photography combine for a broad understanding of the Dena'ina way of life. N 979.83 Den (2010)

"Living Our Cultures, Sharing Our Heritage: The First Peoples of Alaska" Edited by Aron L. Crowell, Rosita Worl, et al. Though covering all Alaska native peoples, this volume has a particularly comprehensive section on Dena'ina with exquisite photographs of their material culture.
